Kids and Adults in Elections



This is a continuation in a series of Bradford Bridge interviews with people in Bradford.

Caryl Ann Walker was born in Westwood, Mass. She attended public schools there, then earned a BA at Colby in New London and a MS in Home Economics from Simmons College in Boston. She taught Home Economics in Avon, Mass. and then moved to Bradford in 1976. Her career veered in different directions for ten years. She started a needlepoint design business, worked as a pastry chef for Millstone restaurants in Concord and New London, and was a caregiver for a 92 year old woman on weekends.

Her next venture was working for Public Service of New Hampshire teaching an electrical safety program to 4th and 5th graders throughout New Hampshire. From The Editor

Recent town elections across the state have signaled bad news for big ticket municipal projects. For our own town, the warrant articles for new town facilities failed to win enough support to pass for the third year in a row. In spite of the admirable work of several NAC committees in developing and presenting comprehensive plans for municipal buildings, the multi-million dollar price tags have been denied time after time. The new county jail, nursing home and middle school projects have pushed taxes to the breaking point for our citizens, many of whom see property taxes and gas prices skyrocketing while salaries and incomes remain unchanged. The sinking economy and lack of confidence for improvement in the foreseeable future is a detriment to keeping up needed infrastructure maintenance throughout the state. For a state budget based on increasing property assessments and taxes, the squeeze can be felt for each citizen whether financially flush or not. For low wage earners, single parents, elderly on fixed incomes, disabled and average families living paycheck to paycheck, paying the fuel bills and putting food on the table are priorities that are getting more difficult to manage every year. Speaking with neighbors and town residents, there seems to be agreement that whether the town facilities are on the upper or lower site, whether a new road is needed or the old will do was not at issue in voting on facility proposals this year. People generally agreed that facilities are sorely needed, long overdue in fact, but this year, they're voting with their pocketbooks and for many, their pocketbooks are empty. Let us hope that next year is better so we can finally give our town what it needs.

In March, we talked about our town. We identified the various businesses and services provided by our town and discussed the idea of community. We marked the location of our own homes on maps of our town. The children

also designed and built a town of their own.

featured on television.

Q. Let's talk about the courses that you teach. Is your course an elective or required in the school syllabus?

I teach Culinary 1 and 2. The proper title is Career Technical Education (CTE.) I like having the Juniors in Culinary 1 and Seniors in Culinary 2. This makes these students "concentrators." We get Perkins Grant money (Federal money) for these courses. It's really not part of the curriculum. The courses are electives and run five days a week with two and one half hour sessions. The students get two credits for each course and over the two year period that is a lot of time spent studying an elective course. The best part for me is that 85 to 90 percent of my students go on to careers in culinary arts. This year's graduating class will be going to some of the finest culinary institutes on the East coast. They will attend Johnson and Wales, New England Culinary Institute and one student will be interning at the Balsams.

Q. Are you teaching males and females together? Do you feel that these courses will set a pattern for future careers or long term patterns in providing interesting meals for themselves and their families?

Together. There are some kids who take the courses with no interest in culinary arts. Many change their

minds and become interested in a career. There's a lot of problem solving involved and they learn the science of cooking. They learn math skills with the ability to change amounts involved. They also learn challenging work skills.

Q.Do you enjoy cooking and baking? Did you come from a



family where meals were aesthetically pleasing, interesting, palatable and nutritious?

I do enjoy cooking and baking. I prepare a meal every night. I rarely buy prepared food. Yes, I did come from such a family. We always had dinner together at 5 pm and it was planned and colorful and delicious. My mom loved cooking, loved holidays and decorating the table. Food always looked beautiful. My mother was first generation Swedish. Her family worked as cooks and tailors. Home Economics was definitely in the family.

Q. You came to Bradford 32 years ago and renovated a wonderful historic building on West Main



Street. Are you pleased with the results and how long did the renovation take?

I bought the Old Grange Hall which was originally FH Messer Carriage Repository built before 1900. It was a carriage dealership the early version of a car dealership. I am pleased with the results so far. The renovation began when I moved in. I designed the kitchen and bathroom, refinished the floors and painted . It's an ongoing project. I still have two floors to complete. The building is large with three and one half stories.

Q. You appear to have an interest in preservation and bought a rather dilapidated building to restore rather than a newer dwelling with less maintenance. Have you always nourished a passion for architectural preservation?

I looked at it in late September. I remember going into the Grange Hall floor. There was a huge Beech tree next to the windows and the tree reflection made the entire room glow with a golden color. I can still see the windows flooded with golden light. I grew up in old houses and love the history inherent in an older building.

Q. As a resident of Main Street do you have any thoughts on what can be done to spruce up the area and restore Town Hall?

I would love to see Town Hall restored. Any building that was treasured and moved from its first location deserves attention. It would be nice to have home type small business on Main Street.

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Q. You have a long commute to Plymouth every day and a stressful job. Do you find time for other interests?

Unfortunately, my day is wrapped up in school from the end of August until mid-June. I have no time for anything else. My job involves planning and correcting papers, My classes cater all the functions at the school. We provide food for the school cafeteria and from now on there are large school functions where we provide food for large groups. Culinary Arts teachers do a lot of this type of catering.

Q. If you had the opportunity would you change anything in your life?

I sometimes wish I could have been an architect or probably something in botany. I love where I live. I would like to have more time for other things.

Q. Do you feel that people as individuals can make a difference and make life better? Are you someone that looks at the glass half full or half empty?

My glass is always half full. I think people can make a difference one at a time. I'm an adviser to the national Technical Honor Society. One of the things we do is called "Adopta-Platoon." My classes write letters to a platoon in Iraq once a week. We send cookies. We don't know where they are and we never hear back from them. I think there is hope. There has to be.

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Planning Board Notes

Organization: The Board welcomed new members to the Board – Sonny Harris and Barry Wheeler. Phil LaMoreaux was elected as chair, Bill Glennie as vice-chair. The Board also voted to appoint Jane Johnsen as an alternate member of the Board. Jeff Aarons and Carol Meise continue as alternates. **Ledgewood Pines**: Mark Brunnel of Maplewood Development updated the Planning Board on the status of conditions that must be met before subdivision on Old Warner Road can be finalized. The boundary adjustment and voluntary merger plans will be submitted along with the final revised plan. In order to meet NH Department of Environmental Services (DES) requirements the number of lots, based on soil groups, has been decreased from 24 to 22. DES will approve an initial 16 building lots based on the current well proposed; the remaining units will require another well. The Board voted to approve an extension for Ledgewood Pines until June 15, 2008, and to place the proposed revocation of the subdivision at this

Preliminary Consultation: Barry Wheeler discussed how the recently adopted gravel pit regulations affect his application for renewal of his gravel pit operation on Center Road. Wheeler stated that the pit has been in operation for 13 years, a revolving bond is in place for restoration, and the permit currently runs through this month. He was advised that a new application must be submitted and abutters notified. The application and approval could be addressed at the same meeting and waivers may be requested if he feels they are necessary. A Public Hearing will be held at the Town Hall at 7 PM on April 8 regarding this application.

Grants: Brooks McCandlish discussed a grant the Conservation Commission is seeking that would provide GIS mapping as part of the updated Natural Resources Inventory. The Board voted to write a letter of

As we welcome in the spring season after a long and snow-filled winter, I thought I would discuss a more pleasant topic than short sales, foreclosures and credit scores. You can achieve this more than one way. For example, you could have one side of the room match the other side exactly with furniture and decorative pieces of the same size and shape, or you can have asymmetrical balance by using one larger piece of furniture offset with several smaller pieces of furniture or objects.

Harmony. Expand on balance by creating a pleasing whole with the furniture arrangement, accessories and wall color all coming together to create a pleasing whole. Repetition works well here, using color, texture or shape to your advantage. Picture a green chair, green in your window treatments

and green accent pillows on the sofa. You can change color intensities from deep to light and still create harmony. Be careful, however, not to have too much of a good thing.


Emphasis. I learned this from asking a designer friend to help me pick out a paint color for a bedroom. Every well-designed room needs a focal point. It could be a fireplace, a painting, a wonderful quilt for the bed – that draws the eye into the space. If you have a large room, you may need several focal points. Use these focal points to create interest within the space. This also works well when you have a combination room, such as a dining/living room. Create a different focal point to highlight and separate the rooms visually.

Functionality. While great design can transform a home, don't forget that you have to live in that home, too! If you create a room for the kids to play in, make sure the furniture has durable fabric and that you have fun chalkboards or cork boards on the wall and lots of neat storage areas so everything is off the floor. Also, don't make buyers wonder what a room is being used for by using the office to fold and store laundry or the living room as a kid's play room.

School District Report

Thanks to all of you who came out to vote on the municipal and school ballots on March 11th. All school articles passed including the budget, capital reserve funds, the new well for the high school (which the state was going to require regardless of the vote) and the approval to transfer funds to cover our unexpected special ed increases.

For both the taxpayers and the board, these unexpected special education costs are difficult to plan for and to pay for. As a member of the NH School Boards Association I had a chance last month to travel to D.C. and meet with staff from our congressional delegation to tell them how much these unfunded mandates that are created in Washington really affect the people back home in small towns like Bradford. Hopefully they will listen.

If you have not been able to visit the new middle school, all I can say is Wow! It is a great building and a great investment in both our kids and the value of our communities. It will serve us for many many years to come.

To date we have had 8 snow days and contrary to rumors, there is no plan to cancel April vacation, institute Saturday school or extend the school day. We built extra days into the calendar and we are still okay.

A topic you may hear about soon is two-tier busing. What this means is basically having the middle & high schools open at one time and all the elementary schools open at another. This means we can separate the vounger and older kids and have

Fitness and Nature Trail

Ready for a short walk (or snowshoe) this spring? Students at the Bradford School have been getting some of their exercise and learning on the new Fitness and Nature Trail behind the school. The school sits on 26 acres of land. Look behind the school playground and there's a new sign that marks the trailhead and shows a map of the four trails. There's a loop.

The trail is a "work in progress," according to PE teacher, Cathy Robjent. Work on the trail began in 2005 as part of the HNH Grant project. Steve Patten surveyed the land. Many parent volunteers like Steve Newman helped Patten cut the trails. Mr. Spadaro and Mrs. Robient named the trails. Credit goes to Mr. Robjent for the new trail signs, and there are now four trails. Go for the Gold Trail, Blue Ridge Trail, Bradford Rocks Shortcut and Patten Path (in thanks to Steve Patten).

"It's a good ten minute walk in the woods," according to Kris Lee who takes her fifth grade out on the trail.

PE classes have been snowshoeing around the trail last month with snowshoes that were acquired as part of the HNH Grant. The third graders made fairy houses with Mrs. Nadeau and Mrs. Castor this fall and the second graders did tree identification. "We went out to identify evergreen vs. broadleaf trees," said Mrs. Bewersdorf, "followed up by additional walks to do leaf and bark rubbings." The third graders also used the trail for descriptive writing and poetry and are planning to do some animal tracking as part of a science unit.

Trail help is needed. Mrs. Robjent has always dreamed of a Nature and Fitness Trail for the school and community and got it in her 27th year. She's now looking for some volunteers this spring to do some drainage work and some "30 year old backs" to dig out some stumps. Call the school 938-5959, or see Mrs. Robjent if you can help. 



Plastics Recycling Begins!

Lois and I would like to thank the residents of Bradford for helping us realize over \$31,000 in gross recyclable revenue for 2007. Now, with our new plastics recycling program, we hope to supercede last year's gross income through the sale of the recycled plastics and the resulting reduced trash compactor tipping fees.

For now we are accepting #1 and #2 plastics. The stamped numbers can be found inside the triangular "chasing arrows" recycling logo, generally found on the bottoms of the plastic containers and bottles. The numbers indicate the type of plastic resin used, but do not necessarily mean that the item is recyclable due to the manufacturing process and/or additives used in the manufacturing of the container or bottle. Generally, #1 and #2 plastics include many beverage bottles, milk jugs, dish and laundry detergent bottles, and peanut butter jars.

The #1 and #2 plastics that you recycle will be turned into beverage and shampoo bottles, fleece, pipes, fencing, deck planks, and gutters. Recycling five #1 plastic soda bottles yields enough material for one square foot of carpet or fiberfill for a ski jacket.

Many residents would like to recycle all of the plastic that they discard and some day we hope that the plastics industry will find a way to recycle all of the plastics that are manufactured. In the meantime, we all can reduce our plastic waste. Buy products with minimal packaging in containers that can be recycled or in concentrated forms. Reach for the lotion in a recyclable container, the tomatoes sold individually, the concentrated detergent in the smaller bottle, and so on. Bring along a washable travel mug for the daily latte and a refillable water bottle for drinking water. Pack lunches in reusable containers versus disposable plastic bags. Tote a cloth bag to the store to carry purchases home.

We encourage all residents to shrink their carbon footprint. Please start bringing your #1 and #2 plastics to the Bradford Transfer and Recycling Center. Lois and I are glad to help you to understand and participate in our new plastics recycling program.
