Special Town Meeting

Moderator Brackett Scheffy opened the Special Town Meeting on June 16 at 7:05 PM with 106 in attendance. The article read: To see if the town will authorize the sale of town-owned property, Tax Map 6 and Lot 102 upon such terms as may be negotiated by the Selectmen.

Selectman John Pfeifle gave a presentation explaining that this was an important opportunity for Bradford to increase the tax base, create jobs, and bring cash to Town by permitting the sale of the town sand pit at the corner of Jones Road and Route 114. Remaining sand would be removed by the Town over the next three years. A building would be erected to bring a minimum value of \$500,000.00 (L&B) within 18 months. This would be open to other bidders but they must meet the minimum requirements.

Selectman Harry Wright stated his support for putting the property back on the tax map but instead of taking an opportunistic sale at the moment, would rather wait two or three years until the sand is gone. An organized three-year plan, working with state and regional development organizations, would identify a broader base of potential developers and better serve the town.

After discussion, a motion was made to close debate. Brackett Scheffy asked for a hand count.

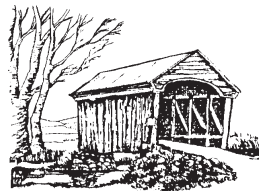

Selectmen’s Highlights

Meetings - Chair John Pfeifle stated that future meetings of the Board will be run in a civil manner. Anyone wishing to speak will state his/her name and the topic being addressed – no raised voices, no offensive language. All selectmen concurred.

Highway Department – Following a discussion of road cleaning after the heavy sand application this past winter, selectmen voted to vacuum up sand in the future rather than using any other method.

Fire Department - Three Thousand dollars (\$3,000) was received from sale at auction for the fire department generator.

Ambulance Service – Discussion continues regarding the joint ambulance service between Bradford and Henniker. A meeting has been scheduled with the Henniker Board of Selectmen in Henniker on July 8.

Autocraft – Selectmen requested the Chief of Police’s assistance to follow up on a code issue at the facility on Route 114. This has been referred to Town Counsel for recommendations.

Conservation Commission - Ann Eldridge presented a map showing a project initiated by the Town of Warner to nominate the Warner River as part of the River Management and Protection Project. This will increase awareness of rivers and provide more control as well as give leverage for grant writing. It does not affect zoning and would not preempt any existing Bradford regulations. Selectmen will write a letter of support to the Town of Warner.

Ann also mentioned the long term Recreational Trail being worked on by the Rural Heritage Commission. This will encompass the Tillie Wheeler Trail and runs from Hopkinton to Newbury.

Broadband and Telecommunications - Harry Wright attended a Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission Training Event regarding: “Making the Connection: What Communities need to know about Broadband and Telecommunications.”

Breezy Hill Bridge – Replacement of the bridge over the Warner River at Route 103 may be moved up by a year or two on the State schedule. Detailed plans should be complete within the month.

Plans are underway to repair the bridge over Melvin Brook at the Route 114 end and re-open it for limited vehicular traffic.

Parks and Rec – Selectmen agreed with the request from the Parks and Rec. Committee to place two picnic tables on the front lawn of the Community Center.

Budget - Selectmen and Administrator Cheryl Behr reviewed the status of the 2014 Budget and concurred that halfway through the fiscal year, the budget, as approved at Town Meeting, is overspent by 2%.

Resignation – Selectman Pfeifle read a letter from Marjorie Cilley submitting her resignation as secretary for the Board effective August 31, 2014.

Planning Board Notes

Historical Society: On July 8 there were discussions about the site near the Smithy. Non-binding recommendations can be offered at that time.

Excavation Regulations: Board members Steve Chase and Mark Keith are reviewing amendments to the current regulations in order to bring reporting/permitting times in line with state requirements.

Resignation: The Board accepted, with deep appreciation and much regret, the resignation of Marjorie Cilley as Secretary to the Board. For the past nine years, Marge has kept the Board and the public on the right track with meeting minutes, financial records, letters and files.

CIP Update

By the deadline date of May 9, Fifty applications were submitted to the Capital Improvements Program Committee from the Library, Transfer Station, Community Center, Town Hall, and Police, Highway and Fire Departments. The applications were reviewed and were discussed with the department representatives. Committee meetings in July and August will use selected criteria to prioritize the projects. Consultant Stephanie Alexander will construct a spreadsheet showing all of the projects and their rankings. This will enable the committee to recommend an improvement schedule that seeks to keep funding for the town's capital needs as level as possible from year to year. The plan will be presented to the selectmen and Budget Committees in October as a guide in the preparation of next year's budget.

Meetings will be held at 6 PM on July 15 and August 5 at the Community Center and are open to the public

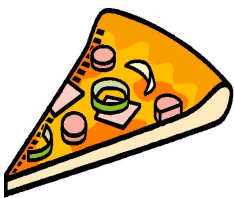

Cemetery News

The season opened a little late this year due to the intense frost and snow. By the Memorial Day weekend the cemeteries were raked and mowed.

Thanks to the Lucas family, flags for veterans of all wars were in place and many families had placed flowers in memory of their loved ones.

Head stones at Howlett Cemetery were cleaned this spring. What a difference. The letters on the stone are much easier to read and in one instance revealed an epitaph that had been hidden by mold, moss and lichen. More on-going cleaning will be done starting with the cemeteries most visited. If anyone has an interest in helping with the cleaning of the stones, please contact a member of the cemetery committee.

Some of the easiest leaning stones have been straightened. The more damaged stones need to be restored by professionals. This is done based on the expense each year. The oldest damaged ones are done first. Sometimes the stones have disintegrated to the point of not being able to be repaired. Every post winter walk-through reveals more downed or broken stones.

Presently, it's mow, mow, mow and mow some more. Part of the maintenance that is being addressed is removing dead shrubs and trimming shrubs that are taller than the head stone as is directed in the cemetery rules and regulations.

Citizens of Bradford are proud of their town and are working hard to improve its appearance. Having the cemeteries well kept is another way of proving that pride.

All proposals should be submitted to the Bradford Selectmen's office in the Bradford Area Community Center at 134 East Main Street or by mail at P.O. Box 436, Bradford, NH 03221 by June 27th, 2014 at noon.

The Board reserves the right to refuse any and all proposals. The award will be made by the Board for construction during the month of July.

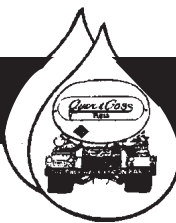

Town Hall Restoration Update

The THRC members have been working hard to regroup and move forward on restoration goals. This year's vote was particularly close and failed by only six votes to meet the 2/3 criteria needed to pass the bond. Undaunted, the committee is moving forward with the sure knowledge that a healthy majority of voters support this project and understand the value of preserving this important historical building's renewal.

So, here is an update of the past year's committee work:

Over the winter, the building sub-committee worked with architect Dave Drasba and Bruss Construction on a new design. The entire committee was pleased with the results. We are keeping the current project plans. In early winter, the committee prepared for town meeting by developing two warrant articles. A presentation was made to the Select Board, the Budget Committee and at a bond hearing.

A town forum was held to present the plans to the community.

Bruss Construction recently closed and this was a disappointment to the entire town and the THRC in particular. They were a significant partner in our project and will be greatly missed.

The approved warrant articles allowed the committee to move forward with roof repairs. Selectmen are in the process of reviewing RFP's for the roof construction. Meanwhile, we are working with the project architect on civil engineering and other preconstruction costs.

Capital Campaign:

We are planning a three year capital campaign. We will identify donors and request pledges, the first payment of which will be due this year.

We have many ideas for fundraising events including the 3rd annual Independence Day art exhibit at Town Hall, a silent auction, fall fundraisers and possible having a kick-off campaign at the Lake Massasecum Casino.

Outside

People have been reporting an unusual number of bears this summer. This past winter they enjoyed a long, carefully orchestrated nap. Their goal come autumn will be to again eat five times their summer intake of largely vegetarian and insectivorous fare - aiming for a five inch layer of fat. As the weather cools down, so will their appetite. Appetite in bears is controlled by leptin - a hormone that is secreted by fat cells and circulates in the blood. When there are a lot of fat cells, it sends a message of appetite suppression to the brain. As the weather warms in spring, their hunger returns only slowly. Bears in good condition still have some remaining fat in spring and are no hungrier on arising than when they hunkered down. This is essential because expending a lot of energy in late fall and early spring searching for scarce food could be fatal.

“Hibernation” is no longer an easily defined word. Bears in winter are slightly sluggish but by no means unresponsive. They show only a modest drop in body temperature and respiration and their heart rate remains essentially unchanged. For five or more inactive months these couch potatoes don't suffer thirst, require no bathroom facilities, and have only negligible loss of muscle mass. Despite lack of exercise, they lose no bone density. Their cholesterol levels in winter are double their summer readings (and double that of humans), yet even an old bear has supple arteries. They don't get bed sores and, barely stirring, the sows give birth to tiny, non-hibernating offspring.

How bears accomplish all these metabolic feats is still as sketchy as their complex social interactions. Most of us think of bears as large, potentially hazardous beasts galoomphing through deep woods and occasionally galloping across roads. Ben Kilham, a bear researcher from Lyme, NH, describes bears as highly social creatures that are rarely in actual physical contact because their large food requirements usually keep them widely spaced. When food sources are abundant, for instance in Eccardt's corn fields, bears set up food allocation systems that allow even non-related bears to benefit. It is a matriarchal system with the dominant female call-

ing all the shots. Bears are repelled by and attracted to each other across the landscape like magnets. The landscape is a dynamic place for them with complex visual and olfactory messaging systems.

Bears have a varied repertoire of vocalizations and can teach by demonstration. These attributes, Kilham writes, along with a capacity for remorse, empathy, and deception, indicates a highly developed sense of self-awareness and an awareness of the minds of others. Killham has recorded what appears to be altruistic behavior, putting them in the same hierarchy of intelligence as the larger primates.

Which brings us to the seasonal drama of bears at bird feeders. At 160 calories per ounce, bird food is a powerful attraction. Bears prefer not to risk approaching human artifices but some do and they appear to map routes for themselves and their friends. Bears that rob feeders are often young males hard-pressed between their mother's territory from which they've been ousted in mid-summer mating season and the holdings of dominant male bears. Bird food thieves will get by on the margins until they are large enough to claim a place for themselves or emigrate. And some bears are getting too acclimated to our homes and yards for their own good.

It certainly is easier to see wildlife lured to your backyard than in the woods - be it birds or bears. People who intentionally feed wildlife have all the positive results of watching “their” deer, turkeys, and more but accept none of the responsibilities when things go awry. Human-habituated wildlife unwittingly then break our rules.

Sooner or later most bird food addicted bears are shot. If supporting wildlife is your intent, plant native NH food plants away from your house, and then spend more time in the woods.
