Voting Returns to Town Hall

When the polls opened at 8 AM on September 13, 2016, it was the first time since 1996 that voting was held at the Town Hall. Beginning in 1990, the adjourned (business) portion of Town Meeting was held at the Bradford Elementary School. Voting for election of officers and zoning amendments continued at the Town Hall until



1997 when all voting was moved to KRSD – Bradford. Following Town Meeting this year, the Town was advised that the school could not be used for voting during the day when school is in session. As work progressed to move town offices back into the historic building, Town Clerk, Camila Devlin, reviewed the space requirements, found the area to be adequate and with her crew of volunteers prepared for voting on Primary Day. She reported that 400 votes (20 by absentee ballot) were cast that day, a 32% turnout! A 90% turnout is anticipated for the General Elections on November 8, 2016, a challenge for election officials and for the old building.



Zoning Board of Adjustment


William Heselton (Map9/Lot45) presented an application for a Special Exception to establish a 2.9 +/-acres junk yard located about 500' from County Road.

Cemetery Commissioners

Estimates from Corner Stone Services were presented for grave stone repairs at Pleasant Hill Cemetery. The total cost for uprighting 3 fallen stones, repairing 2 broken stones and leveling 20 stones is \$2,050. To level 20 stones at Old Burial Grounds at Bradford Center is an additional \$700. The trustees discussed submitting a warrant article so that repairs could be done in a timely manner.

Looking Back

As we celebrate our first twenty-five years bringing local news to the Bradford community, we continue to look back at the early issues. A headline in October 1991 read **Bradford Selectmen chastised by school board**. The KRSD expressed concern over Bradford's "…alleged late payment of school district assessments." The article went on to cite the ongoing apportionment suit as a factor in delaying the payments along with the perennial over-assessments by misapplying children who live in other towns to Bradford's ADM (average daily membership). (Note:The apportionment issue was somewhat modified by vote at the district meeting in 1995 and it is hoped that children are now assigned to the correct home towns.)

Another article covered a talk given by Julian Dodge at the Historical Society. He described the moving of buildings, introduction of electricity, and the twelve school districts that served the town. Trash Flash announced the long awaited arrival of the baler, which awaited wiring by Chris Mock and Ken Anderson before it could be put into service.

Bradford Sports by Debbie Pickman noted that Barry Wheeler took first place at a meet in Nova Scotia in the US-Canadian Ox hauls. Mildred Schmidt's *Cozy Corner* shared a seasonal recipe that is worth repeating.

Mildred's Apple Cake	
1 ¹ / ₂ c.vegetable oil	3 cups flour
3 eggs	2 tsp vanilla
1 cup brown sugar	1 cup white sugar
1 tsp baking soda	½ tsp salt
¹ / ₂ tsp baking powder	$\frac{1}{2}$ - 1 cup chopped walnuts
2 tsp grated orange peel	4 large apples, peeled and coarsely chopped

Mix oil, sugars, eggs and vanilla. Beat until smooth. Add flour, baking powder, salt, and orange rind. Stir until smooth. Add apples and nuts. Pour into greased 9" tube pan or two loaf pans. Bake I hour at 350. Frost if desired.



George Fearnley, of Concord, and recently of New London and Sarasota, Fla. died Monday, Sept. 5, 2016. He was born

Jan. 28, 1923, in Rochester, N.Y., the son of George Lyle and Elva (Zimmerman) Fearnley. He was a graduate of Cornell University, receiving an MBA in 1949. He spent four years in the U.S. Air Corps during World War II serving as a 2nd Lt. Navigator. His business career included General Electric's Jet Engine Division and National Distillers and Chemical Corporation's USI Film Products. His second career was as a professor of business administration at New England College in Henniker and Lesley University, Cambridge, Mass. While at New England College he was head of the College's British Campus in Arundel, England.

He and his wife, Alma Houghton Copp (who predeceased him in 1989) enjoyed traveling extensively in the United States, Europe, Asia and North Africa. He also enjoyed dancing, cars, and moving to a new house.George was an active volunteer for SCORE, Rotary, Kiwanis, Salvation Army and Junior Achievement.

He leaves his son, Neill Stewart Fearnley, an artist, and his wife, Marie of Byfield, Mass. and a daughter, Margaret Lyle (Meg) Fearnley, librarian for the Town of Bradford. He also leaves grandsons, Lyle, and wife, Emily of Singapore, Glenn of Bradford and Will of **Obituaries** Somerville, Mass. A great joy to him was his great-granddaughter.

Beth lived in California, Connecticut, Rhode Island, Vermont, Massachusetts and Michigan as Bob fulfilled his duties as a chaplain and minister.
